2009 Health Disparity Fact Sheet Asians/Pacific Islanders in Colorado



This fact sheet provides information about some of the major health indicators for the Asian/Pacific Islander population in Colorado. Like other communities of color, Asians/Pacific Islanders experience some differences in health, risk factors and behaviors in comparison to other population groups. The data presented show comparisons between the Asian/Pacific Islander population and the State's population as a whole and identifies where there are differences. The disparity column shows if the Asian/Pacific Islander rate is statistically worse (red), better (green) or the same (white) as the state rate. If it is the same, that means there is no statistically significant difference.

There are roughly 145,000 Asians/Pacific Islanders in Colorado which is about three percent of the State's population. (2007 data, State Demography Office, Colorado Department of Local Affairs)

- The median household income for Asians/Pacific Islanders is \$3,038 more than the state median.
- The poverty rate for Asians/Pacific Islanders is basically the same as the overall state population.
- More Asians/Pacific Islanders graduate from high school than the state's population as a whole.

- Infant death and low weight births are about the same as for the population as a whole.
- Almost 40% of all Asian/Pacific Islander births are from unplanned pregnancies.
- The teen birth rate is less than half the rate of the state.
- Asian/Pacific Islanders report less stress, but about the same amount of drinking and smoking during pregnancy.
- Asian/Pacific Islander children have about the same obesity rate as the state overall.

Asians/Pacific Islanders have a similar pattern of risk behaviors as the State's population as a whole. They are:

- Just as likely to engage in binge drinking.
- Somewhat more likely to eat five or more fruits and vegetables a day (not statistically significant).
- Less likely to be obese or overweight. Asians/Pacific Islanders have one third of the rate of obesity as the state's population as a whole.

- The Asian/Pacific Islander population is as likely to have health insurance as all Coloradans.
- Asian/Pacific Islander women are just as likely to have had a mammogram or pap test as all Colorado women.
- Asians/Pacific Islanders have similar rates of diagnosis of high blood pressure, diabetes and asthma.

• Asians/Pacific Islanders have a higher rate of new cases of Tuberculosis (TB) and Chronic Hepatitis B. Both of these rates are 10 times higher than the state population. Their rates for gonorrhea and HIV/AIDS are the lowest rates of any racial/ethnic group.

• The top two leading causes of death, cancer and heart disease, are the same for Asians/Pacific Islanders as they are for the State's population as a whole. Diabetes is ranked fifth for Asians/Pacific Islanders, but 8th for the State. Kidney disease is in the top 10 causes of death for Asian/Pacific Islanders, but not for the state as a whole. Atherosclerosis is one of the state's top 10 causes of death, but is not for the Asian/Pacific Islander population.
